





- To provide responsive, accountable and easily accessible machinery for settlement of grievances and to take measures in the college undertakings to ensure expeditious settlement of grievances of Students in order to maintain a harmonious educational atmosphere in the institute.
- It is to deal with the complex situations in a tactful manner to lessen the condition felt to be oppressive or dissatisfied.
- Encouraging the Students to express their grievances / problems freely and frankly, without any fear of being victimized.
- Advising Students of the College to respect the right and dignity of one another and show utmost restraint and patience whenever any occasion of rift arises.
- Advising all the Students to refrain from inciting Students against other Students, teachers and College administration.
- Advising all staffs to be affectionate to the Students and not behave in a vindictive manner towards any of them for any reason.
- To support, those students who have been deprived of the services offered by the College, for which he/she is entitled.
- To make officials of the College responsive, accountable and courteous in dealing with the students.
- To ensure effective solution to the student's grievances with an impartial and fair approach.

### **Functions of Grievance Redressal Committee**

• The function of the Committee is to look into the complaints lodged by any student, and judge its merit. The Grievance Committee is also empowered to look into matters of harassment.

- Anyone with a genuine grievance may approach the committee members in person, or in consultation with the class in-charge.
- The cases will be attended promptly on receipt of written grievances from the students. The Grievance Committee will act upon those cases which have been forwarded along with the necessary documents.
- The Grievance Committee will assure that the grievance has been properly solved in a stipulated time limit provided by the Committee.
- The Committee formally will review all cases and will prepare reports about the number of cases received. The Committee will give report to the authority about the cases attended to and the number of pending cases, if any, which require direction and guidance from the higher authorities.

### **6.8 Anti Ragging Measures:**

### **ANTI-RAGGING COMMITTEE**

Ragging has ruined countless innocent lives and careers. It is now defined as an act that violates or is perceived to violate an individual student's dignity. Ragging is totally banned in the campus and anyone found guilty of ragging and/or helping ragging is liable to be punished as it is criminal offence.

In conformity with Supreme Court judgments and directions, UGC guidelines and State Government Instructions, Viswanadha Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Visakhapatnam follows an Anti-Ragging policy' towards ragging. Any student of the college, accused and found guilty of ragging, will be severely dealt with, in accordance with the Provisions of the Law.

### **Anti-Ragging Policy**

According to the UGC Regulation on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Institutions, 2009, ragging constitutes one or more of any of the following acts:

- Any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.
- Indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student.
- Asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
- Any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher.
- Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students.

- Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person;
- Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, post, public insults which would also include
  deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating
  in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student.
- Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying and exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.

### **Punishments**

According to the UGC Regulation on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009, those found guilty may be awarded one or more of the following punishments, namely;

- Warning, writing apology letter
- Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
- Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits.
- Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process.
- Withholding results.
- Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- Cancellation of admission.
- Rustication from the institution for period ranging from one to four semesters.
- Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period.

### **Roles & Responsibilities of the Chairman**

To create self-confidence and congenial environment among the newly admitted students by way of conducting frequent interactive sessions to clear the doubts related to academic matters, social interaction and compatibility.

### **Roles & Responsibilities of the Convener**

Based on the first hand information and prime-facie evidence, the convener submits report to the Principal for necessary disciplinary action. Severe punishment will be recommended on the accused, if proven.

### **Objectives of the Anti-Ragging Committee**

Anti-Ragging Committee will be the supervisory and advisory committee in preserving a Culture of Ragging Free Environment in the college Campus. The main objectives of this cell are as follows:

- 1. To aware the students of dehumanizing effect of ragging inherent in its perversity.
- 2. To keep a continuous watch and vigil over ragging so as to prevent its occurrence and recurrence.
- 3. To promptly and stringently deal with the incidents of ragging brought to our notice.
- 4. To generate an atmosphere of discipline by sending a clear message that no act of ragging shall be tolerated and any act of ragging shall not go unnoticed and unpunished.

### **Functions of the Anti-Ragging Committee**

- To uphold and comply with the directions of the Hon'ble Supreme Court and be vigilant on any acts amounting to ragging;
- To publicize to all students and prevalent directives and the actions that can be taken against those indulging in ragging;
- To consider the complaints received from the students and conduct enquiry and submit report to the Anti- Ragging Committee along with punishment recommended for the offenders;
- Oversee the procedure of obtaining undertaking from the students in accordance with the provisions;
- Conduct workshops against ragging menace and orient the students;
- To provide students the information pertaining to contact address and telephone numbers of the person(s) identified to receive complaints/distress calls;
- To offer services of counseling and create awareness to the students;
- To take all necessary measures for prevention of Ragging inside the Campus.

### POLICY ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT

In accordance with the directives of UGC, NAAC, and the Supreme Court, Viswanadha Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences has formed an Anti-Sexual Harassment committee. The purpose is to ensure a positive and welcoming environment for both the faculty and the students of the College.

### Declaration of the Policy:

Viswanadha Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences, is committed to respect the dignity of every individual. It aims to foster the development of its human resources, ensuring the complete protection of human rights. The institution guarantees the full realization of "Fundamental Rights" as outlined in articles 14, 15, 19(1)(g), and 21 of the Constitution of India. It also upholds the dignity of workers, employees, employment applicants, students, and those undergoing training, instruction, or education. In pursuit of these principles, all forms of sexual harassment within the employment, education, or training environment are deemed illegal. The institution fully implements the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act 2013.

### Objectives of the policy:

- Formulating guidelines and norms for an Anti-Sexual Harassment policy.
- · Developing principles and procedures to address and prevent sexual harassment.
- Detailing the implementation specifics of the policy.
- Creating a comprehensive action plan encompassing short and long-term objectives.
- · Conducting gender sensitization awareness programs.
- Establishing a neutral, confidential, and supportive environment for campus community members who may have experienced sexual harassment.
- Devising a mechanism for preventing and addressing instances of sexual harassment and other acts of gender-based violence within the institution.

### **Composition of the Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee:**

- 1. The Committee will be led by a senior woman faculty member of the college, holding the designation of the "Chairperson."
- The committee will include the Principal and two senior women teaching faculty as the members.
- 3. Additionally, the committee will feature three nominated girl student representatives.

### Meetings of the Committee:

The Committee shall convene meetings when ever needed. Resolutions passed by the Committee must be recorded during the meeting and read aloud by the Chairperson. Within seven days after the meeting, an approved copy of the minutes will be sent to the Chairperson of the Constituting authority and all the Committee members.

### Additionally:

- The Committee has the authority to summon witnesses and request documents or information from any employee or student.
- If the Committee believes that an employee or student can provide relevant documents or information, it may direct the person to produce them through a written notice or summons.
- If relevant information is recorded or stored electronically, the Committee can request its production or a clear written reproduction.
- Upon receiving the requested documents or information, the Committee may make copies
  or extracts and retain them for the necessary period.
- The Committee can issue interim directions concerning any person involved in the proceedings.
- The Committee can recommend actions against individuals found guilty of sexually harassing the complainant, retaliating or victimizing the complainant or others before the Committee, and making false charges of sexual harassment against the accused person.

### **Functions of the Committee:**

### 1. Preventive Steps:

- The Committee aims to establish a safe environment free of sexual harassment.
- It strives to encourage behaviors that foster an atmosphere promoting gender equality and equal opportunities.

### 2. Remedial Steps:

- Ensure that the mechanism for registering complaints is safe, accessible, and sensitive.
- Take cognizance of complaints related to sexual harassment, conduct inquiries, provide assistance and redress to victims, recommend penalties, and take necessary action against the harasser.
- Advise the competent authority to issue warnings or involve legal measures to stop the harasser, with the complainant's consent.
- · Seek medical, police, and legal intervention with the complainant's consent.
- Arrange for appropriate psychological, emotional, and physical support, such as counseling, security, and other assistance, if the victim desires.

### **Annual Report:**

At the conclusion of each academic year, the Committee's Chairperson will compile an Annual Report detailing the Committee's activities throughout the year. A copy of the report will be forwarded to the Chairman of the Viswanadha Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences.
